Galveston County Health District Clinic Patients Potentially Exposed to HIV, Hepatitis

The Galveston County Health District is urging people who received dental procedures at Coastal Health & Wellness Clinics between March 1, 2015 and Feb. 13, 2018 to be tested for Hepatitis B, Hepatitis C and HIV.

Officials stated a "very scary" breach of medical protocols has caused concern about possible infections HIV, Hepatitis B, and Hepatitis C.

During an accreditation inspection, officials identified 11 "immediate threat-to-life" violations at the Coastal Health and Wellness Dental Clinic in Texas City.

The district has set up a hotline for people to receive information about potential exposure and to schedule appointments. The hotline number is 409-938-2397.

The hotline will be available March 26, at 7:30 a.m. The hotline will be available until 7 p.m Monday through Thursdays. And from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Fridays and Saturday.

Testing appointments can also be made at gchd.org.

Free testing services will be offers from March 26 until April 13.

Edward Gaillard Snyder III died on January 20, 2018 in Baylor College of Medicine/St. Luke's Hospital in Houston from complications of a heart condition, diabetes, and other illnesses. Ed was a beloved character on the Bolivar Peninsula of Southeast Texas, greatly loved, and his talent in photography and writing spreads from the Gulf shores to many states and several foreign countries. He also is well known in the East Texas Lakes region and covered fishing, boating, and nature in both locations, as well as in Choke Canyon, the Rio Grande Valley, and other places his travels provided.

A gathering of Big Ed's friends was held at the beautiful new Galveston County/High Island ISD Hurricane Recovery Center in High Island, where Superintendent and Principal Travis Grubbs served as host for the day on Saturday, March 3, 2018. As guests made their way into the new building, they were treated to a display of 13 of Ed's most requested works displayed in 16 x 20" matted photographs.

Ed was a proud US Marine and never allowed anyone to forget his love of his country. Ed was in the active duty Marines for four years serving in the Bay of Pigs Invasion and aboard ships in the area of communication. He also served in the US Marine Reserves after ending his active duty. Three handsome, young Marines from the Galveston District presented military honors including the folding of the flag and the somber playing of Taps. Not a dry eye was to be seen in the auditorium as the first notes of that solemn song rang out in the afternoon's stillness. Crusty old fishermen, friends of Ed's, cried like newborn babes.

Paul Vick, acclaimed entertainer from concert stages across America and around the world, performed several of Ed's favorite songs, opening with The Anchor Holds, and including a spicy Cajun tune in Ed's memory. Paul also led the congregation in singing two of Ed's favorites, Amazing Grace and Shall We Gather at the River. Several of Ed's closest friends spoke briefly about parts of his interesting and expansive life. Topics included fishing, photography, his many fishing reports, fighting for Rollover Pass to remain open, opening and managing the Walter Umphrey Pavilion on Lake Sam Rayburn, his last days in the various hospitals, and some humor. Speakers included Ted Vega, President of the Gilchrist Community Association

and coworker with Ed concerning Rollover Pass, Charles O'Neal, Nancy Bachman, Rick Talley, Sharon Duke, and myself.

Mark Blieden introduced famed artist Keith Carter, and Donna Meeks, Chair of the Arts Department at Lamar University. An announcement was made about the creation of the Ed Snyder Memorial Scholarship for Photography at Lamar University. We have discovered that though there have been scholarships for the Arts in many forms, not one has ever been designated to go to a talented photography student. A committee has undertaken an Endowed Scholarship in the amount of \$15,000 to make this dream come true. We feel this is a wonderful way to help keep Ed's memory alive and to honor his life in a positive manner. He would be pleased that a young person is benefiting directly from his life and talent.

We asked the members of the audience to look closely at their programs, and in honor of Casper, Ed's famed rescue cat, should they find a cat sticker, they were to stand and come to the front of the auditorium. Each of these 13 guests won one of the elegant photographs on display and there were some eager takers as they chose the gift they most wanted.

The assembly was dismissed to meet on the beach in front of Emerald I for the symbolic scattering of the ashes. This was very important to Ed because he was baptized by Pastor Jerry Valentine in the exact same location shortly after Hurricane Ike. Charles O'Neal donned his wet suit and took the ashes out beyond the breakers for scattering. The wind was biting, the surf was rolling, and it was cold on the beach, but Ed's wishes were honored. The group then gathered at Ed's beloved Rollover Pass for fellowship and food and a good time of getting acquainted.

It is difficult to say our earthly goodbyes to a man like Ed Snyder, but we gave it our best shot and reminded ourselves often that we will indeed see him again, and perhaps soon, in the Heavens. We appreciate every person that worked to help make this event meaningful, purposeful, and unique, and that it was.

Ed Snyder had what we call 'the eye,' which means he was exceptional in his choice of subject, light, context, and composition. He told a story with each photograph and added the capability of 'feeling' what he was trying to present to others.

"I did not agree with him on his views on politics or religion, but he had my whole heart with his love for the Bolivar Peninsula and the Sam Rayburn/ Toledo Bend lakes. I revere his work and wish him well in Fiddler's Green. Rest easy, Shipmate." (Dennis Harper on The Bolivar Peninsula Facebook site).

Cooking with Miss "Obler"

We often get ground turkey at Food Fair and many comment that they don't know what to do to make it taste good. When I attended Weight Watchers, ground turkey dishes were a staple. Thought I'd share some of my favorite recipes with you all. I don't know how they would "count" today, but even if you are not trying to lose weight, these are some good tasting recipes. Enjoy!

SWEET 'N' SOUR CABBAGE AND BACON SAUTE Serves 2

2 teaspoons vegetable oil

6 ounces Canadian-style bacon, cut into cubes

1 cup sliced onions

- 4 cups shredded green cabbage (about half of a 1-1/2 pound head)
- 1 tablespoon plus 1-1/2 teaspoons white vinegar

1-1/2 firmly packed brown sugar

dash of pepper

In 10-inch nonstick skillet, heat oil;add bacon and onions and saute' until browned. Add cabbage and stir until thoroughly combined; add remaining ingredients and cook, stirring occasionally, until cabbage is tender and liquid has evaporated.

CABBAGE CASSEROLE Serves 4

- 1 pound ground turkey
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 green pepper, chopped
- 1 small head cabbage
- 1 8 ounce can tomato sauce
- 1 cup picante' sauce
- 2 cups water
- 4 ounces uncooked rice
- salt, pepper to taste

Brown turkey and onion in stew pot. Add all other ingredients. Simmer on low until rice is tender and moist and liquid is cooked out (about 30 minutes with lid on).

ORIENTAL RICE SKILLET Serves 4

1-1/2 pounds ground turkey2 tablespoons minced onion flakes1/4 cup soy sauce3 packets instant beef broth (or 3 teaspoons granules0

1-1/2 cups water with 2 teaspoons cornstarch, dissolved

4 ounces uncooked regular grain rice 2 cups sliced mushrooms, fresh or canned salt, pepper to taste

Brown turkey in skillet. Add all remaining ingredients and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer until rice is tender and liquid is cooked out. Cook about 30 to 40 minutes. Stir occasionally. Makes 4 big servings.

STUFFED BELL PEPPERS Serves 6

3 large bell peppers, cut in half
1 pound ground turkey
6 ounces uncooked rice
1 medium onion, chopped
2 tablespoons chopped, fresh parsley
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
1/2 teaspoon red pepper
1 teaspoon salt
1 - 8 ounce can tomato sauce

Mix together and stuff bell pepper halves with equal amounts. Spray casserole dish with non-stick spray and arrange peppers in dish. Pour 1 - 16 ounce can stewed tomatoes over the top of peppers. Cover with foil. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

TACO POTATOES Serves 4

1 pound ground turkey 1/2 cup chopped bell pepper 1/2 cup chopped onion 1 package taco seasoning mix 3/4 cup water

Brown turkey. Add pepper, onion, seasoning mix and water. Cook until vegetables are tender. Serve 1/4 meat mixture over a 3 ounce cooked potato. Top each with 1 ounce shredded cheddar cheese, 1/2 cup shredded lettuce, 1/2 cup chopped tomatoes.

EASY CHILI

- pound ground turkey
 cup chopped onion
 large can tomatoes
 ounces cooked red beans (dried
 teaspoons chili powder
 salt and additional spices to taste
- 1 8 ounce can tomato sauce

Brown turkey in skillet. Add all other ingredients. Simmer to blend for 30 minutes.

BUFFET ENCHILADAS Serves 4

- 1 pound ground turkey, cooked and crumbled
- 1 cup tomato sauce
- 1/2 cup skim milk
- 4 ounces grated cheese
- 1/4 cup mushrooms
- 1 small can chopped green chilies
- 1/4 teaspoon cumin
- 2 teaspoons chili powder (optional)
- 8 corn tortillas (torn in pieces)

Combine all ingredients except cheese and tortillas. in a sprayed casserole dish, line bottom with 1/2 of tortillas. Layer meat, cheese, tortillas; ending with cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 30-40 minutes.





A HUGE Slice of Pi Don't be misled!

Anyone who has ever sat in a math class has probably wondered the same thing.

What is pi? Not the kind of pie that we eat, but the kind of pi that gives mathematicians an appetite. Put simply, pi is an irrational number, which means it cannot be made into a fraction. It can only be written as an infinite number. It also never repeats itself. Pi originally represented the ratio of a circle's circumference to its diameter, but it is used all over the world of



mathematics today. Its symbol is universal and symbolic.

Many people from across the world celebrate pi day, even if they don't share the same language. The discovery of pi stretches back to the ancient Babylonians. Humans have studied pi for about 4000 years. During this time, mathematicians have also created their own pi language. Many people also try to competitively recall the infinite number. The record belongs to Chao Lu, of China, who recited pi from memory to 67,890 places. That's about 67,887 numbers longer than most people know! Some scholars even believe that pyramids in Egypt have been calculated around the use of pi. Pi has been used in many different areas throughout history, and it continues to be a worldwide phenomenon.





Age-related eye diseases such as macular degeneration and cataracts commonly cause impaired vision and blindness in older adults. But lifestyle changes, including good nutrition, could help delay or prevent certain eye problems. Besides adopting a healthy diet, you also can protect your eyes by avoiding intense ultraviolet (UV) light, quitting smoking and getting regular checkups that may help detect chronic diseases contributing to eye problems. Diabetes, for example, increases your risk for age-related eye diseases and may cause diabetic retinopathy.

Regular eye exams, too, are essential for maintaining eye health as you grow older. If eye problems and chronic diseases are detected early enough, appropriate treatment may prevent permanent vision loss. Diet is an extremely important part of the daily lifestyle choices you make. Foods you eat and the dietary supplements you take affect your overall health as well as the health of your eyes.

Eat plenty of colorful fruits and vegetables for optimum eye health. A diet high in saturated fat and sugar may increase your risk of eye disease. On the other hand, healthy foods such as greens and fruits may help prevent certain eye diseases and other health problems. Cardiovascular disease, diabetes and eye conditions including cataracts and agerelated macular degeneration have been shown to

occur less frequently in people who eat diets rich in vitamins, minerals, healthy proteins, omega-3 fatty acids and lutein.

All healthy diets should include ample amounts of fresh, colorful fruits and vegetables. In fact, experts recommend that you consume at least five to nine servings of these foods daily. Choose dark green or brightly colored fruits and vegetables to obtain the most antioxidants, which protect your eyes by reducing damage related to oxidizing agents (free radicals) that can cause age-related eve diseases. Lutein, found in dark green leafy vegetables such as spinach and kale, is one of the best known eyeprotecting antioxidants. Sweet corn, peas, and broccoli also contain large amounts of lutein. Vitamin A, vital for healthy vision, is found in orange and yellow vegetables such as carrots and squash. Fruits and vegetables also provide essential vitamin C, another powerful antioxidant.

Supplements such as these vitamin pills containing essential fatty acids and vitamin E can help maintain vision.

Try following these diet guidelines to improve your chance of healthy vision for a lifetime:

1. Eat whole grains and cereals. Sugars and refined white flours commonly found in breads and cereal may increase your risk of age-related eye diseases. Choose instead 100 percent whole-grain breads and cereals that have lots of fiber, which

slows down the digestion and absorption of sugars and starches. Fiber also keeps you feeling full, which makes it easier to limit the amount of calories you consume. Experts suggest that at least half of your daily grains and cereals be 100 percent whole grains.

2. Make sure fats are healthy. The omega-3 essential fatty acids found in fish, flaxseed oil, walnuts and canola oil help to prevent dry eyes and possibly cataracts. Eat fish or seafood twice weekly, or take flax oil every day. Use canola oil for cooking and walnuts for snacking.

3. Choose good sources of protein. Remember that fat content and cooking methods are what make proteins healthy or unhealthy. Also, avoid saturated fats from red meats and dairy products that may increase your risk of macular degeneration. Choose lean meats, fish, nuts, legumes and eggs for your proteins. Most meats and seafood also are excellent sources of zinc. Eggs are a good source of lutein.

4. Avoid sodium. High sodium intake may add to your risk of cataract formation. Use less salt, and look for sodium content on the labels of canned and packaged foods. Stay below 2,000 mg of sodium each day. Choose fresh and frozen foods whenever possible.

5. Stay hydrated. Round out a healthy diet with low-fat dairy products such as skim or 1 percent milk for calcium, and healthy beverages such as 100 percent vegetable juices, fruit juices, non-caffeinated herbal teas and water. Proper hydration also may reduce irritation from dry eyes.





Battery Kimble

When you first drive into Fort Travis, the first thing you really notice is the large concrete hill to your immediate left. Well, Folks, that is Battery Kimble.

Travis is named after Major Edwin Richardson Kimble. He was born in Portland, Oregon 24 September 1892. He moved to Galveston after his father died when he was 9 years old with his mother and younger brother. Kimble graduated from Ball High School in 1908 and went on to the University of Texas in Austin. In 1910 he entered West Point and graduated there in 1915, second in his class.

After West Point he went back to be an instructor at the Academy and was promoted to 1st Lt. By May 1917 he was a Captain. During this time World War I was going on, so he was sent to France in August 1917 with the rank of Maior.

firing line were the Us. S. coast.

engineers commanded by Kimble. Due to his vast knowledge of military tactics and engineering, he was sent to the British Fifth Corps Staff to study the Corps The third battery built at Fort Intelligence Service. During the first ten days of the Battle of Picardy (March 21 - 20, 1918) he was wounded there in Northern France and died in a hospital 9 April 1918. He was never married but was survived by his mother who still lived in Galveston and his younger brother, 2nd Lt. Frederick Von H. Kimble who graduated from West Point June 1918.

battery Kimble work began in August 1917 and was finished in October 1922. The two twelve inch guns had a range of 17 miles and were protected by anit-aircraft platforms. Underground was the support magazine, shell and powder rooms along with a power plant, plotting room and personnel quarters.

Utility Bill Scammers Step Up their Game

Customers should be alert for fraud

Grass and flowers are not the only things growing with the warmer temperatures this year. Utility payment scam attempts seem to be rising as well.

Entergy has received numerous reports that both business and residential customers are getting phone calls that appear to be coming from Entergy with the caller demanding payment for an overdue bill. In some cases, they even know the customer's personal information.

The scam typically occurs when the con artist tells the customer that electric service will be disconnected if payment isn't made. The scammer then directs the customer to transfer funds electronically, sometimes through "MoneyPak", "Green Dot" or other third party card or transfer system. Victims will put money on the card and call the scammer with payment.





The Life and Times of Pontius Pilate, The Law West of the Jordan

History, other than those weird little Jack Chick booklets and stuff about The Lizard People on the GossipNet, says little of Pontius Pilate. Apparently his career in the Roman diplomatic was fairly short before he was retired by suicide.

A life of loyal public service under the emperors was often rewarded with death, which was probably better than a farewell kiss from the president.

As a colonial governor Pilate would have been expected to keep the peace among all sorts of peoples, not because of the benevolence of Tiberius but because tax-tax is always better than war-war (as Churchill did not say).

One wonders if in his corner office Pilate displayed pictures of himself shaking hands with famous people, or maybe ordering their executions, and plaques from the Little Gladiator teams he sponsored. Did he give speeches at local business dinners? "I am Praefectvs Pontivs Pilatvs, but you may call me Poncho. I'm from Rome, and I'm here to help you grow your businesses."

No doubt the after-dinner speech included a few wheezes: "Say, boys, you'll like this one. A Greek, a Roman, and a Jew walk into a bar owned by an Egyptian..."

Pontius Pilate probably gave motivational speeches (which in itself should be a death penalty offense) and talked about thinking outside the box outside of which he never thought himself, and kept his resume updated in hopes of a better gig in a happier colony, maybe Crete or Cyprus or Hispania.

He would have been subjected to scrutiny by spies and investigations by special prosecutors, and in turn would have sent around the highways and byways of the Empire his own spies and, when he felt he had the power and the connections to get rid of some old pal he didn't now like, special prosecutors under his authority.

His staff would have kept his files cross-indexed and neat, and at midday he probably joined the boys for a two-falernian lunch, properly submitted under his expense account.

Pilate named roads and bridges and theatres for his Emperor, had the usual suspects executed for the entertainment of The People, bless them, and probably told anti-Semitic jokes. He was so dull, safe, successful, and predictable that he was governor for some ten years before being recalled to Rome.

Nothing reliable is known of his end. Pilate is said to have been required to commit suicide instead of being given a cheap Seiko sundial as a memento, but perhaps he did indeed retire to his vineyards in central Italy, and took leisurely afternoons to write his memoirs, in which few were interested and which eventually were used by Germanic invaders to start a fire, and so lost to history.

Whether he remembered one Jesus of Nazareth is unknown.

Ange's Corner Monthly Tip:

Don't give up too soon on those freeze damaged tropicals! I've already heard too many stories of DORMANT plants having been declared DEAD and pulled up by the roots. If they don't sprout back from lower branches they are likely to come up from the ground. Keep them watered and BE PATIENT. I've had some tropicals come back as late as July to return previous splendor. If you can't resist taking them out give them to a gardener.

One more reminder as we get into spring gardening mode: Water LONGER, DEEPER, LESS OFTEN to establish healthy root systems. A couple months to go. We and most of our tropicals are gonna survive!

Rollover Pass

Traces of Texas reader Bill Hand kindly shared this nifty circa 1957 photo of folks gathered at Rollover Pass. What I find hilarious is that the sign says "no fishing on bridge" and there are so many people fishing on the bridge. Texans! Rollover Pass (also called Rollover Fish Pass) is a man-made strait that cuts through private property on the Bolivar Peninsula. It was opened in 1955. It earned the name "Rollover Pass" from the practice of smugglers who, from the days of Spanish rule through prohibition, avoided the Galveston customs station by rolling barrels of import or export merchandise (i.e., whiskey and rum) over the narrowest part of the Bolivar Peninsula.



ELISSA is a three-masted, iron-hulled sailing ship built in 1877 in Aberdeen, Scotland by Alexander Hall & Company. She carries nineteen sails covering over one-quarter of an acre in surface area. Tall ships are classified by the configuration of their sailing rig. In ELISSA's case, she is a 'bargue' because she carries square and fore-and-aft sails on her fore and

The Elissa has arrived Galveston. mainmasts, but only fore-and-aft sails on her mizzenmast. From her stern to the tip of her jibboom she measures 205 feet. Her height is 99 feet, 9 inches at the main mast and she displaces about 620 tons at her current ballast. But, she is much more than iron, wood and canvas.

Unlike some tall ships of today ELISSA is not a replica, but a survivor. She was built during the decline of the "Age of Sail" to fill a niche in maritime commerce. Over her 90year commercial history she carried a variety of cargos to ports around the world, for a succession of owners.



Directors Present: George Strong, Vice President; D. J. Hutchison; Wayne Turk; Dennis Stafford; Hollis Gassen, President; Maria Skewis

Item 1 Call to Order: At 6:00 PM President, Hollis Gassen, declared a quorum present and called the meeting to order.

Item 2 Pledge of Allegiance and moment of silence: The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Mr. George Strong and cited by all present. Afterwards, a moment of silence was observed.

Item 3 Approve minutes of the January 9, 2017 general meeting:

A motion was made by George Strong and seconded by Wayne Turk to approve the January 9, 2017 minutes as presented. Motion unanimously passed.

Item 4 Committee Reports:

Audit & Finance: Mr. Dennis Stafford reported the Audit and Finance Committee had met earlier today and reviewed the District's invoices, check registers and bank statements for January and found everything to be in order.

Item 5 Public Comments: There were no public comments.

Item 6 Manager's Report: The manger's report was presented by Mr. Jody Ball and the following items were reported and/or discussed:

1) A Review of Trial Balance, Comparative Budget Report and Account Balance Summary List: The board reviewed the Trail Balance Report, Comparative Budget Report

and the Account Balance Summary through January and found everything to be in order.

2) Review System Operational Reports:

* District Water Losses. The District experienced a four-month average water loss through January of 13% and 16.20% for the month.

* The District has 4,866 active accounts through January. In January, 2 accounts were liquidated and 28 shut off for non-payment.

* Total water sales for January were \$290,155.75

*Average monthly water bill for January is \$59.63.

* Water pumped was 28.5M gallons and water sold was 15.5M gallons with a loss difference of 13.0M gallons. There were 10 leaks repaired (cold weather challenges).

* No reportable accidents or incidents during the month of January.

3) Review current infrastructure projects: A meeting was held between the District and county engineers to review the drawings for the proposed elevated tank at Singing Sands plant are 60% completed.

4) Rollover Pass: There is no additional information available.

5) Personnel: The District is fully staffed.

6) Finances: Net income for January is \$-52,823. FEMA is completing reviewing"IKE" projects. Their preliminary findings are that the District's balance with FEMA is zero.





Crusts and Lace

A popular term in non-technical science writing is "living fossil". Such creatures as horseshoe crabs, lungfishes, and the chambered nautilus are examples: forms of life which have an ancient and extensive fossil record, but today exist only as a bare

remnant of their former glory. The very term "living fossil" suggests decadent, unchanging species that have almost miraculously survived the tooth of time and are merely holding on to existence as curiosities.

But what shall we call creatures which are clearly recognizable from exceedingly ancient geological periods, yet have survived every extinction event and are common and diverse today? One such group is the "moss animals"

or Bryozoa. Even though their skeletons are abundant as encrusting "laces" or plantlike growths in the sea drift, few people other than specialists know much about them. However, a little patience and a magnifying lens or microscope will reveal an amazing beauty in these relatively unknown but common creatures.

The Phylum Bryozoa consists of almost exclusively colonial, largely marine organisms. They first appeared in the fossil record some 450 million years ago in the Ordovician period and have enjoyed a highly successful, diversified evolutionary history right up to the present. The individual animal, called a zooid ("Zoo-oyd") is always encased in a secreted shell of calcium carbonate or leathery protein. Individually tiny, zooids of a particular species multiply as clones of one another to produce an easily-seen colony.

Bryozoan colonies commonly form lacy patterns on seaweeds, rocks, and shells, or may form upright "rooted" growths that resemble small seaweeds. Under magnification, bryozoans colonies reveal repeating, wonderfully complex patterns and structures, many of which have an unknown function and pose a challenge for the serious aquatic naturalist. A common species in Texas is Membranipora tuberculata (pictured), which encrusts the blades of floating Sargassum seaweed. Each coffin-shaped "cell" in the colony, called a zooecium,

opens to the outside to allow the polyp-like animal within access to the sea. Numerous, regularlypositioned holes between the zooecia allow direct communication between the animals in the colony through actual connections of their bodies.

In many bryozoans, certain zooids are specialists in feeding or colony defense. Most of the zooids feed on tiny planktonic organisms captured by tentacle-like organs called lophophores. The famous naturalist Charles Darwin was fascinated by the beak-like structures of some zooids (aptly named avicularia) which probably serve to snap at and kill or dislodge small creatures that land on the colony surface. Others produce structures called vibracula that look like bristles or hairs and can be swept across the zooecia like tiny brooms. Still others may specialize in the production of eggs or sperms. Some bryozoan

species have colonies containing up to a dozen different kinds of zooids.

Reproduction in the bryozoa can be rather complex, involving both asexual (budding) and sexual forms. Reproduction by budding or fragmentation is

> very common, with some species able to start a new colony from a fragment containing only 2-3 zooids. Sexual reproduction may involve the broadcasting of eggs and sperm into the sea, or may involve the retention of fertilized eggs in special zooecia called ovisacs. Here they are protected while they advance in development beyond simple embryos.

> A single zooid forms from the development of a fertilized egg. This pioneer may settle on an object as small as a sand

grain. From this simple beginning, a huge crust or "lacework" colony containing hundred of zooids, many specialized, grows if conditions are favorable.

Not all bryozoans have a crust-like form. Many form flexible seaweed-like colonies that are attached to rocks, pilings, and the undersides of boats. A few are considered major fouling pests, such as the imported "sauerkraut bryozoan" Amathina verticillata. This seaweed-like animal has massive die-offs during the cold season, liberating the dead colony skeletons to dry up as pale brushy wisps on shore or to foul the lines of bayside fishermen.

Interestingly, there are a few kinds of freshwater bryozoans. Some (Pectinatella) resemble huge blobs of jelly and are found in North American lakes. Others (Plumatella and Fredericella) are found worldwide in ponds and ditches, attached to wooden trash, stones, and other flat surfaces. The wide distribution of these freshwater bryozoans is due to specialized reproductive structures called statoblasts. These pinhead-sized encapsulated embryos are ringed with tiny hooks that attach to the feathers and feet of ducks and other birds, giving them easy access to ponds along the bird's migration routes. They are common in the freshwater ponds on the Bolivar peninsula and make fascinating objects for microscopic examination.



aren't hungry because of all the bait that is around them.

Every where that I have been in the East Bay has been chalked full of pinky nail size shad. With bait not being a huge priority because of its abundance, a lot of the fish are going to seek comfort from any springtime front that might blow in and push the water out. Paying very close attention to the weather and tide right now is almost key to catching fish. Look to the deeper structure when the fronts blow in and the shallower structure when the water returns.

Trinity Bay should be holding some of the heavier fish in the complex due to the over whelming abundance of bait. Typically, the fish in the upper reaches of the bay systems will be fatter because the bait fish spawn occurs earlier than in the lower reaches of the bay. Remember, no matter where you decide to wade, wear your lifejacket at all times, use safety precautions, and be aware of your surroundings! The cause of ET is unknown; however we do know that there is an abnormal communication between certain areas in the brain.

This is an inherited disorder, believed to be autosomal dominant. This means that each child of a parent with ET has a 50% chance of developing ET.ET can occur at any age, rare before the age of 10. Most commonly it is after the age of 40.

Diagnosis of ET is usually made by a neurologist or movement disorder specialist. The doctor may order a magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) to rule out some other cause of the tremor. There are other causes of tremor, i. e. Parkinson's disease and others, but are not treated the same way.

In fact, prescriptions, over-the-counter medications, illicit drugs, alcohol, and some herbal remedies may cause or worsen tremor. The goals of treatment are to: reduce tremor severity, improve ability to function,

Essential tremor (ET) is a common and decrease the social handicap. The class of drugs used to treat ET is called betablockers. Propanolol (Inderal) or primidone (Mysoline) are the main medications used. The doctor may try two or three medications before benefit is achieved. There are other medications in the benzodiazepine class, i. e. diazepam (Valium) that may be added. With medication treatment 50% reduction in tremor is considered good.

> Sometimes botulinum toxin (Botox) injections into the affected muscle may block the tremor-sending signal from the brain. The injection must be repeated around every 3-5 months and can cause muscle weakness as a side effect. In some cases, a deep brain stimulator may be implanted, which sends an electrical impulse through the lead wire implanted in the brain and can dramatically take away tremor symptoms. The lead wire is attached to a heart pacer type of device implanted in the chest.Persons with ET should work closely with their care provider, in order to find the best treatment option for their symptoms.
