Hwy 87 and Hwy 124 Update











Pictured above from left to right, Picture 1 shows layers and layers of asphalt that have started to crumble causing the beachside traveling lanes to become more narrow.

Pictured 2, the area between the old barricades and newer barricades, showing deteriorating layers of asphalt.

Picture 3, a side view of the layers of asphalt sitting under a new barricade, layers seem to crumble under top layers

Picture 4, shows the placement of the pole barricades on top of crumbling asphalt and a new concrete barricade starting to lean.

Picture 5 is another view of the asphalt under the new pole barricades, while chunks of the highway break off and fall towards the new leaning concrete barricades.

Traveling east on Hwy 87 at the curve, a visible layer of asphalt over the old asphalt. New barricades have been set in front of metal and pole barricades, with another layer of barricade below and in front of the old barricades.

The TxDOT website posts the estimated construction cost at \$18,956,286 for a project length of 6.738 miles and up to 4 years for completion.



Blast from the Past

"We've met the enemy and he is us." Thus, said the councilman who really knew what he was talking about.

Petitions were circulated on the beach during December and reportedly gather over 800 signatures in a short time. The signed petitions authorized Democratic Precinct Chairman, Mrs. Joe H. Kahla, to respectfully request the County Commissioners Court to retain the Justice of the Peace Court in Precinct Eight on the Bolivar Peninsula.

A delegation headed up by Judge Richard A. Black along with Constable Joe Faggard, Mr. and Mrs. Jester Smith, Mrs. Sophia Kirkpatrick, Mrs. Ann Kahla, Andrew Johnson, Harry Hughes and others attended the Commissioners Court to present the petitions.

Ange's Corner Monthly Tip:


I had a request from a reader to write about container gardening. I have TOO MANY plants in containers! Most of these are meant to be happy campers in my landscape. My goal is to keep them ALIVE until I can set them free in the earth. Every now and then the roots from one of my captives will escape into the earth. I first notice how happy the plant looks then I realize it has made contact with the earth; no wonder it's happy.

I WILL have a few plants that remain in containers. Just a few because I consider container gardening higher maintenance than plants that thrive in the earth with little effort. A plant in a container is totally dependent on YOU. If you don't give them water they have no chance of getting it from the water table in the ground. Plants with a lot of foliage may not even get hydrated when it rains as water tends to roll off the foliage outside of the pot. Remember plants absorb zero water through the leaves. They only release moisture through the leaves. Make sure to water the SOIL. I use saucers under the containers to catch run through water and allow water to wick back up into the soil; especially helpful during the heat of summer. I also use mulch on potted plants. Mulch holds in moisture and adds nutrients to soil, just as it does for plants in the ground.

Plants outgrow their containers and require an upgrade in pot size or release into the earth. I spend so much energy upgrading pots I don't have time to get them into the ground. Once in the ground there is a natural ecosystem that provides nutrients for the plants. Plants in containers generally need feeding; by YOU. I don't use plant food unless the plant isn't looking healthy. Struggling plants are more susceptible to insects. MiracleGro is my go-to plant food. I usually have earthworms working for me in my potting soil. I read that MiracleGro is like putting salt on a slug to an earthworm so I am reluctant to use it on plants that don't need it. As a plant becomes root bound the need for feeding increases. I prefer an upgrade at that point.

Plants in pots are more vulnerable to heat and cold since the roots aren't below ground level. When freezing temps are expected make sure the soil is moist. Moist soil fairs better than dry! Protect as best as you can. Sometimes, south side, out of north wind is enough. For extended hours of freeze more protection is needed. Covering the plants will do little without a heat source. Even a light bulb can make a difference with covering. Remember if you go to great effort to protect plants from cold they still need sun and water. Might have to drag them in and out more than once. Hoping for no freeze this winter but be prepared; have a plan.

inspection. Five leaks were detected and repaired, * The District has 5034 active accounts through October. In October, 1 account was liquidated and 30 were shut-off for non-payment. * Total water sales for October was \$300,554.00 *Average monthly water bill for October was \$59.87 and the average water bill for 2018 is \$63.00. * Water pumped was 26.2M gallons and water sold was 17.2M gallons with a loss difference of 9.0M gallons. * There were 0 reportable accident/incidents for the month.

ROLLOVER PASS UPDATE

Motion denied; Reversed in Part and Remanded, and Memorandum Opinion filed December 21, 2018.

In the Fourteenth Court of Appeals NO. 14-17-00681-CV GILCHRIST COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION, Appellant

COUNTY OF GALVESTON, TEXAS, Appellee On Appeal from the County Court at Law No 2 Galveston County, Texas Trial Court Cause No. CV-0076026 MEMORANDUM OPINION

This appeal involves a condemnation suit brought by Galveston County against the Gulf Coast Rod, Reel and Gun Club (the Club) and Gilchrist Community Association (GCA). GCA challenges the trial court's judgment in two issues. First, GCA contends the trial court erred by concluding it lacked standing. Second, GCA contends the trial court erred in granting summary judgment in favor of Galveston County because Galveston County lacked statutory authority to 2 condemn the property. The Club does not itself appeal the trial court's judgment but has submitted a brief challenging GCA's appeal. Galveston County moves to dismiss GCA's appeal for lack of standing. We deny the motion, reverse in part, and remand.

I. BACKGROUND

Rollover Pass is a piece of property on Bolivar Peninsula. In March 2016, Galveston County filed a petition in condemnation seeking to condemn the property. At the time Galveston County filed suit and for many years prior, the Club owned the property while GCA managed and maintained it. In its petition, Galveston County named the Club as the owner of the property. GCA filed a notice of appearance in the suit, claiming to be a tenant of the property.

The trial court appointed special commissioners, and GCA appeared at the special commissioners' hearing on the condemnation. At the conclusion of the proceeding, the special commissioners awarded the Club \$1,600,000 for the property. The special commissioners made no award to GCA. GCA objected.

After GCA's objection, on August 16, 2016, Galveston County amended its petition to include GCA as a defendant. The petition described GCA as "an entity which either owns, possesses, or claims some interest in title to the land described[.]"

On August 24, 2016, Galveston County deposited the amount awarded by the special commissioners into the court's registry.

On March 21, 2017, Galveston County filed a motion for summary judgment regarding its right to take. In a footnote, Galveston County noted that it disputed GCA's claim to any ownership interest in the property. Both the Club and GCA responded to the motion for summary judgment. On April 19, 2017, the trial court 3 granted partial summary judgment on Galveston County's right to take and granted possession to Galveston County.1 The value of the property had yet to be determined.

Subsequently, Galveston County filed a Motion to Require Proof of Standing or, Alternatively, to Preclude the Offer of Evidence ("Motion to Require Proof of Standing"). In the motion, Galveston County argued that GCA lacked standing to seek affirmative relief, or alternatively, should be precluded from offering evidence at trial. Galveston County asserted that GCA lacked standing because GCA had "no personal stake in the litigation at the time the condemnation was filed." In its reply in support of its motion, Galveston County prayed for the trial court to "dismiss the GCA as a party" after "find[ing] the GCA lacks standing." On July 21, 2017, the trial court signed an order granting the motion "in all respects," ordering that GCA "lacks standing in this cause, and in the event of trial, shall be precluded from offering evidence of any kind."

On July 26, 2017, Galveston County and the Club entered into an agreed final judgment in which the court found Galveston County was entitled to condemn the property and the Club should be awarded \$1,750,000 as compensation. In addition to awarding condemnation to the County and the settlement payment to the Club, the amended agreed final judgment stated that GCA was not entitled to any compensation for the taking of Rollover Pass because of the trial court's finding that GCA lacked standing:

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What Were You Doing When You Were Nineteen?

The late President Bush was a teenager when he enlisted in the Navy in 1942. He was selected for flight school and earned his wings despite being given mediocre marks by his instructors. When he was nineteen he was the skipper of a three-man torpedo bomber and flew over fifty combat missions in the Pacific against real Fascists who would have joyfully cut off his head.

In our time there are still nineteen-year-olds in the military, and nineteen-year-old firefighters and EMTs who pull the wounded from burning cars and burning buildings, sometimes under fire from the local village idiot (who of course is a sensitive and misunderstood victim of meany-ness). There are lots of nineteen-year-olds even now who know death very well, and who also know how to save lives amid the chaos and racket of a firefight or a fire.

I am sure that when a nineteen-year-old man or woman gets off duty at the fire station or the emergency room after a long, hard shift of danger and of service to humanity, he turns on the car radio to hear some fat old man dismissing the nineteen-year-old's generation as snowflakes.

Well, okay, I was pretty snow-flakey.

When I was nineteen I was hopeless and clueless, and Texas A & M agreed and advised me to make fresh arrangements for my future.

Shortly thereafter I was in recruit training being called – bellowed, really – insensitive things by some mean old man (who was probably around thirty-five). I used to joke that if my mama could hear what he was yelling at me she'd certainly have some things to say to him about how he was treating her little boy.

But the reality is that my mother had been a war-widow at nineteen after her young husband's oiler, the Muskogee, was torpedoed off the Carolinas in 1942. Given how callow I was at nineteen, she would have probably suggested to CPO Davison that he was being entirely too nice to us lads.

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
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Bryan Wolf's Famous Map

Gobies - The Frog-Faced Fishes

Whenever I am gathering oysters for a meal of oyster stew on the bayward side of the Bolivar Peninsula, I always make a point of examining any discarded sunken glass bottles that I find. Poured out slowly through a fine-mesh net, all sorts of interesting creatures come to light that had commandeered the bottle for a home. Snapping shrimps (Alphaeus spp.), small crabs, worms, and even fish often take over bottles as if they were tiny caves. One especially interesting group of fishes that utilize these glass houses are the gobies (Family Gobiidae).

Gobies are an enormously successful group of largely marine fishes. They are found all over the world and are thought by many scientists to be the largest group of fishes. Many colorful tropical reef species are popular in the marine aquarium trade. A few brackish-water species such as the colorful Indonesian bumblebee gobies (Brachgobius spp.) find their way into freshwater tanks.

The goby "trademark" is a pair of fused abdominal fins that forms a sort of suction cup on the ventral side, allowing the fish to climb and cling effortlessly to smooth surfaces. However, aside from their fused abdominal fins and rather frog-like faces, gobies are enormously varied. In addition to their often beautiful coloration, gobies have interesting personalities and habits that endear them to aquarists. One group,

represented in our area by the Spotfin Goby (Gobionellus stigmalophus), often share burrows symbiotically with alphaeid (snapping) shrimps. The shrimps, practically blind, do all the work of hollowing out their tunnels in the muddy sand, while the gobies keep a watchful eye out for predators and provide an "escort service" for the shrimps to make sure they do not lose their way outside their burrows.

Several species of goby, including the Neon Goby (Gobiosoma oceanops) are known to provide a "cleaning service" to larger fishes and will actually be allowed to enter the fishes' mouths to remove ectoparasites. Another species, the Yellowline Goby (Gobiosoma horsti) from the Caribbean and south Florida, is never found far from tubular and other massive sponges and is adapted to live in these strange, living mansions.

Of the dozen or so species of gobies commonly found in the northern Gulf of Mexico, I have personally collected only three: the Freshwater Goby (Gobionellus shufeldti), the Naked Goby (Gobiosoma bosci) and the Frillfin Goby (Bathygobius soporator). All three gobies are common on the mud bottoms and in the rubble surrounding low-salinity oyster reefs. The lower salinities of their preferred habitats should be reflected in their aquarium water. I use a 1:1 ratio of standard 1.025 specific gravity sea water to distilled or deionized water when keeping them.

With a bit of patience, the tiny Freshwater and Naked Gobies can easily be spotted by aquatic naturalists. If you sit in a chair at the bay's edge in very shallow water, hidden gobies of these species will appear after a while and begin to take up their normal activities as if you were not there. However, catching them is rather difficult, as they tend to dash to cover at the slightest movement. I have found that by making an umbrella net out of dark 1/8" or finer netting, laying this flat on the bottom and chumming with crab meat or broken shellfish, it is possible to get adventurous gobies to move out onto the netting. They can then be caught by pulling straight up on the net strings.

Another strategy relies on the tendency of these fishes to hide when their surroundings are disturbed. By using a large dip net as a sort of dredge, many small gobies can be caught inside their shell shelters. They can then be separated from them by emptying the dredged shells into a bucket of sea water.

Both Freshwater and Naked Gobies, as well as many other kinds, do very well in small aquaria with shelly sand bottoms

and mild aeration. Although they prefer tiny portions of chopped fish and oysters, they can be trained to accept flake tropical fish food in about a week.

The much larger Frillfin Goby reaches a length of three inches and will require a tank without tiny gobies, which it would probably eat. These fish are territorial and are probably best kept alone, although I have not experimented with this. A somber-looking species that most often shows three dark, distinct saddles set against a khaki-or greenish-brown background, the frillfin sports a curious frilled border along the forward surface of its pectoral fins. This interesting goby is happiest if it is provided with a cave-like retreat such as a curved oyster shell, from which it will launch attacks at any pieces of fish or shellfish that are dropped in front.

I have noticed that frillfins much prefer dark surroundings at first, suggesting that they are nocturnal or crepuscular fishes. However, with patience they can be trained to come out in the light when the aquarium cover is lifted during feeding. Mine adapted to flake tropical fish food within a few days, but small bits of earthworm, fish meat, and other more natural foods are certainly beneficial.

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Galveston Bay Foundation announces milestone: 850 tons of recycled oyster shells

Houston, TX – Galveston Bay has lost a significant amount of oyster reef over many years due to a combination of natural and man-made forces. To help restore the Bay's oyster population, keep our water clean, and provide habitat for aquatic life, Galveston Bay Foundation's Oyster Shell Recycling Program collects shucked oyster shells from local restaurants and returns them to the Bay where they will form the base for new oyster reefs. The program, which began in 2011, recently reached an exciting milestone: 850 tons of oyster shells recycled.

"Instead of ending up in a landfill, the shells we recycle from local restaurants are returned to Galveston Bay where they can make a real difference for the health of our Bay," said Michael Niebuhr, Galveston Bay Foundation's Habitat Restoration Coordinator. "We're thrilled to have reached 850 tons of recycled oyster shells and to continue to grow this program to create an even bigger impact on Galveston Bay habitat."

All the recycled shell is destined to be put back in the Bay. To date, more than half of the recycled shell has been returned to Galveston Bay. This shell has been used in restoration projects big and small around the Bay. Most recently, a large-scale restoration project was completed in Dickinson Bay using 200 tons of the recycled shells. The recycled shells will not only become home to new oysters, but will also create fish habitat. In addition to large-scale projects, thousands of Galveston Bay Foundation volunteers have helped create 1,400 feet of reef utilizing the recycled shells at its Sweetwater Preserve in Galveston.

Former Congressional Staffer Sentenced to Prison for Extensive Fraud and Election Crimes Scheme

Former Congressional Staffer Sentenced to Prison for Extensive Fraud and Election Crimes Scheme

A former congressional staffer was sentenced today to 18 months in prison and ordered to pay \$800,000 in restitution, to be followed by three years of supervised release, for participating in a multi-year scheme to defraud charitable donors of hundreds of thousands of dollars and secretly to funnel the proceeds to pay for personal expenses and to illegally finance campaigns for federal office.

Assistant Attorney General Brian A. Benczkowski of the Justice Department's Criminal Division, U.S. Attorney Ryan K. Patrick of the Southern District of Texas, Assistant Director in Charge Nancy McNamara of FBI's Washington Field Office and Special Agent in Charge D. Richard Goss of the IRS Criminal Investigation (IRS-CI) Houston Field Office made the announcement.

Thomas Dodd, 40, of Houston, Texas, was sentenced in the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Texas by Chief U.S. District Judge Lee H. Rosenthal. Dodd was also ordered to forfeit \$153,044,28 in illicit gains. Dodd pleaded guilty on March 20. 2017, to one count of conspiracy to commit mail and wire fraud and one count of conspiracy to make conduit contributions and false statements. As part of his plea, Dodd admitted that he participated in a scheme led by former U.S. Representative Stephen E. Stockman, 62, who was convicted by a federal jury in Houston on April 12 of 23 counts of mail fraud, wire fraud, conspiracy to make conduit contributions and false statements to the Federal Election Commission (FEC), making false statements to the Federal Election Commission, making excessive coordinated campaign contributions, money laundering, and filing a false tax return. Another of Stockman's former congressional staffers, Jason T. Posey, 48, of Tupelo, Mississippi, pleaded guilty on Oct. 11, 2017, to one count of mail fraud, one count of wire fraud, and one count of money laundering.

Cooking with Miss "Obler"

Here are a few simple party ideas that you can enjoy any time of the year.

BACON, EGG AND CHEESE MONKEY BREAD*

(This can also be served as a breakfast dish)

1-16 ounce can refrigerated biscuits

4 tablespoons salted butter

6 large eggs

1/2 pound bacon

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

2 tablespoons fresh chives

For sauce:

1/4 cup low fat mayonnaise1/4 cup sour cream1 teaspoon lemon juice1/2 teaspoon dijon mustard

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Cook bacon and eggs; set aside.

Remove biscuits from package and cut into sixths.

Place biscuit pieces in a gallon size ziplock bag and toss with 4 tablespoons melted butter.

Add scrambled eggs, bacon, shredded cheese, and fresh chives to the bag and shake to distribute.

Pour mixture into a greased 6 cup bundt pan.

Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

While bread is baking, combine sauce ingredients in a small saucepan and heat, stirring, over medium heat until smooth.

Cool in pan 5-10 minutes, then use a knife or spatula to loosen edges.

Invert bread onto a plate and drizzle with sauce before serving.

*Ingredients listed are for a 6 cup bundt pan.

TACO PINWHEELS

1 package puff pastry sheets (where should be two)

1 pound ground beef

2 tablespoons Homemade Taco Seasoning (recipe follows)

1/4 cup water

1 large tomato, chopped

2 cups Mexican or cheddar cheese, shredded

1 handful chopped cilantro for garnish

guacamole, sour cream, ranch dressing, salsa for serving

Preheat oven to 375 degrees.

Allow the puff pastry to defrost on the counter with a towel over it.

In a pan over medium heat, add the ground beef and cook until almost completely browned.

Drain any fat and add the taco seasoning and water, stirring to combine. Bring the mixture to a simmer over medium heat and allow to cook for another 2-3 minutes or until thickened slightly. Remove fro heat.

Sprinkle a little flour on the counter and roll the puff pastry in a rectangle. Repeat with the second sheet.

Spread the meat mixture over the top and sprinkle with tomatoes, then cheese. Starting with the small end, tightly roll into a log and seal the seam.

Using a serrated knife, slice into pinwheels and arrange on a lined baking sheet.

Bake at 375 for 10 minutes.

Remove and cool for a minute before arranging on a platter with guacamole, salsa, etc. for dipping or garnish them as you'd like before serving.

This is not a great recipe to make ahead of time or freeze.

HOMEMADE TACO SEASONING

7 tablespoons chili powder

1 1/2 tablespoon ground cumin

1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon smoked paprika

2 teaspoons garlic powder

2 teaspoons oregano

1/8 teaspoon coriander

2 teaspoons onion powder

1 tablespoon plus 1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt

2 teaspoons fresh ground black pepper

1 tablespoon cornstarch

1/8 teaspoon cayenne

Add all ingredients to a jar and shake or stir to combine.

Store in a dark, cool cupboard for up to 2 years. Makes 1 small mason jar. Serving Size: tablespoon

CHEESY CORN DIP

6-8 strips of bacon

2 - 15 ounce cans of corn, drained (or 3 cups frozen corn, thawed)

1 - 8 ounce package cream cheese, softened

1 cup grated mozzarella cheese

1 teaspoon salt

dash of cavenne pepper

1/4 cup fresh basil, chopped

Tortilla chips for serving

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Cook bacon in a skillet over medium heat until crispy.

Drain on paper towels, then crumble. Set aside. In a mixing bowl, combine half of the bacon, the corn, cream cheese, mozzarella, salt, cayenne pepper, and half of the chopped basil.

Mix well and spread into a lightly greased 8" x 8" pan, or round dish. Bake for 20 minutes or until hot and bubbly. Remove from oven and garnish with remaining bacon and basil.

Serve hot with tortilla chips.

1/4 cup diced green onion

JALAPENO POPPER DIP

2 (8 ounce packages) cream cheese, softened 6-8 slices bacon, cooked until crispy and crumbled (You can use precooked bacon too) 1 cup mayonnaise (or sour cream or Greek yogurt) 4-6 jalapenos, chopped and seeds removed 1 cup cheddar cheese, shredded 1/2 cup mozzarella cheese, shredded

TOPPING

1 cup crushed Ritz crackers 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese 1/4 cup butter, melted

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Blend cream cheese until smooth and creamy.

Combine bacon, mayonnaise (or substitute), jalapenos, cheddar cheese, Mozzarella cheese and diced onion into a bowl. Stir well.

Transfer mixture to deep dish pie dish or $8" \times 8"$ casserole dish. Spread evenly in dish.

In a small bowl combine Ritz crackers, Parmesan cheese and butter.

Sprinkle all over the top of the dip.

Bake the dip for 20-30 minutes or until bubbly.

NOTES

Serve with Ritz crackers or Wheat Thins as a dip or spoon some on to each cracker and serve.

If making this ahead of time, assemble the dish and refrigerate. Cover for 30 minutes prior to even and serve hot.

This past summer, Galveston County was the victim of a scam that led to the wrongful payment of over \$525,000 of hard-earned taxpayer dollars. [See KHOU story on the scam] Commissioners Court hired an outside fraud examiner to do a complete analysis on not just how this happened, but why it happened. Earlier this month, the Commissioners Court received the final report and analysis. The report specifically stated that "a department or individual cannot be held accountable for noncompliance with processes that may not have been properly designed or that did not exist." The report continued, "a lack of understanding/training of these types of attacks, a lack of vendor information establishment/ change validation processes and a lack of understanding as to which office/department had the responsibility for validation of vendor information...contributed to the accomplishment of the attack." In other words, the fraud examiner's report didn't blame one single department or employee because the lack of policies, procedures, and training in all departments involved contributed to the theft. The individuals in charge of the

departments that did not have the procedures, policies, and training in place were County Auditor Randall Rice and County Purchasing Agent Rufus Crowder - both appointed officials who are responsible to and answer to boards primarily made up of state district judges. To date no one has been fired, no one has been reprimanded, and no one has been held accountable. As your County Judge, I find this completely unacceptable and do not agree with this idea that since all the departments involved had culpability, then we can find nobody at fault or accountable.

I believe in fiscal responsibility and that is why yesterday in Commissioners Court, I called for the resignation or termination of Galveston County Auditor Randall Rice and Galveston County Purchasing Agent Rufus Crowder.] It is abundantly clear based on the facts and evidence that the lack of policies, procedures and training in their respective offices are directly responsible for the loss of over \$525,000 in taxpayer money.

To not have any clear policies or procedures in place on how to change vendor payments is a clear dereliction of duty. This is 2018 and electronic payments have been common business practice for

well over a decade. These two officials should have had protections in place far before this attack ever occurred. Neither of them report to Commissioners Court and unfortunately, all we can do is ask the boards that oversee these departments to do the right thing and vote to terminate them immediately.

The elected officials of this County were elected to protect the taxpayers, and now we must call on them to do what they were elected to do and fire the individuals responsible for losing over half a million in tax dollars. Therefore, I call on the public to contact the the boards in charge of these men and demand that they be held accountable and restore faith in the leadership of our county financial system. A list of the each board and the elected officials along with their contact information is listed below.

Note: I am one of the 5 members on the County Purchasing Board and will be asking for a meeting so I can cast the first vote to terminate the County Purchasing Agent, Rufus Crowder. However, such action will require a total of 3 votes.

at Stockman's trial, from May 2010 to February 2014, Stockman and his codefendants solicited \$1,250,571.65 in donations from charitable organizations and the individuals who ran those organizations based on false pretenses, then used a series of sham nonprofit organizations and dozens of bank accounts to launder the money before it was used for a variety of personal and campaign expenses.

Specifically, the evidence established that in 2010, Stockman and Dodd solicited an elderly donor in Baltimore, Maryland for \$285,000 to be used for legitimate charitable and educational purposes. Stockman and Dodd used a sham charity named the Ross Center to funnel the money to be used for a variety of personal expenses. The evidence further established that, in 2011 and 2012, Stockman and Dodd received an additional \$165,000 in charitable donations from the Baltimore donor, much of which Stockman used illegally to finance his 2012 congressional campaign.

The trial evidence also showed that shortly after Stockman took office as a member of the U.S. House of Representatives in 2013, he and Dodd used the name of another sham nonprofit entity, Life Without Limits, to solicit and receive a \$350,000 charitable donation, to be used to create an educational center called the Freedom House. Stockman, Dodd, and Posey instead

used this donation for a variety of personal and campaign expenses, including illegal conduit campaign contributions, a covert surveillance project targeting a perceived political opponent, an in-patient alcoholism treatment for a female associate, and payments for hundreds of thousands of robocalls and mailings promoting Stockman's candidacy for U.S. Senate in early 2014.

In addition, the evidence established that, in connection with Stockman's Senate campaign, Stockman and Posey used another sham nonprofit entity to secure a \$450,571.65 donation in order to fund a purportedly legitimate independent expenditure promoting Stockman's candidacy. The evidence showed that the purportedly independent expenditure was in fact secretly controlled by Stockman, who directed his campaign and Posey to file false affidavits with the FEC covering up Stockman's involvement.

Finally, the evidence at trial demonstrated that Stockman failed to pay taxes on any of the \$1,250,571.65 in fraudulently acquired donations. In addition, during the early stages of the investigation, Stockman directed Posey to flee to Cairo, Egypt, for two and a half years so that Posey could not be questioned by law enforcement.

The FBI and IRS-CI investigated the case. Deputy Chief Robert J. Heberle and Trial Attorney Ryan J. Ellersick of the Criminal Division's Public Integrity Section and Assistant U.S. Attorney Melissa Annis of the Southern District of Texas are prosecuting the case.

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



ROLLOVER continued

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that, in light of this Court's ruling on July ____, 2017 (sic), granting Petitioner's Motion and Supplemental

1 GCA filed a notice of appeal on April 25, 2017, seeking to appeal the trial court's partial summary judgment. This court docketed the appeal as cause number 14-17-00348-CV, but later dismissed the appeal because the partial summary judgment was unappealable as an interlocutory order.

Motion to Require Proof of Standing or, Alternatively, to Preclude the Offer of Evidence, and finding Defendant, Gilchrist Community Association, to lack standing in this proceeding, any claim by Defendant, Gilchrist Community Association, for adequate compensation for the taking in this proceeding; reasonable and necessary fees for attorneys, appraisers, experts, or other expenses; or any other request for affirmative or monetary relief of any kind is DENIED.

This appeal followed.

II. ANALYSIS

GCA argues that the trial court erred in holding that GCA lacked standing. GCA also argues that the trial court erred by granting summary judgment on Galveston County's right to take because Galveston County's "declared purpose of building a park was a subterfuge for assisting the [General Land Office of Texas] in closing Rollover Pass." Galveston County moves to dismiss the appeal contending this court lacks jurisdiction because GCA lacks standing to bring the appeal.

A. Standing to appeal

As a threshold issue, we must determine the matter of this court's jurisdiction. Galveston County's motion to dismiss GCA's appeal asserts that GCA has no standing to appeal because GCA does not have an ownership interest in the property at issue. This argument is without merit.

Generally, a named party to the suit can bring an appeal. See City of San Benito v. Rio Grande Valley Gas Co., 109 S.W.3d 750, 754 (Tex. 2003). To appeal an alleged error, a party must show that the error injuriously affects it. Torrington Co. v. Stutzman, 46 S.W.3d 829, 843 (Tex. 2000). Contrary to Galveston County's assertion, ownership of property is not required to make this showing in a case involving property. Id. at 844 ("We held that Bi-Ed could 5 appeal despite the fact that it asserted no ownership interest in the property, reasoning that it had a 'justicable interest' in pursuing the case. . . . This is in accord with our well-established rule that, to appeal an alleged error, a party must show that the error injuriously affects it."); Bi-Ed Ltd. v. Ramsey, 935 S.W.

2d 122, 123 (Tex. 1996) (plaintiff had standing to appeal judgment against it in action against city and owner of adjacent property for alleged wrongful obstruction of access to road on adjacent property, since trial court's judgment refused to grant any of relief sought by plaintiff).

Galveston County's contention that GCA has no standing to appeal because GCA does not have an interest in the property is one of the very issues that GCA appeals. To support its argument that the trial court erred by granting Galveston County's Motion to Require Proof of Standing, GCA argues that it has a justiciable interest in the property. This court has jurisdiction to review questions of standing and jurisdiction. State v. Naylor, 466 S.W.3d 783, 787 (Tex. 2015) ("We always have jurisdiction to resolve questions of standing and jurisdiction."). Because GCA is a named defendant in the underlying suit and because GCA appeals the trial court's standing determination against it, we reject Galveston County's argument that GCA has no standing to appeal.2 We deny Galveston County's motion to dismiss and proceed to address the merits of GCA's appeal.

B. Standing before the trial court

2 We are likewise unpersuaded by the arguments of the Club and Galveston County that GCA lacks standing because the Club withdrew the condemnation award from the registry of the trial court. Tejas Gas Corp. v. Herrin, as well as other cases the Club and Galveston County cited in support of this proposition, states the principle that after the landowner has withdrawn an award from the registry of the court or advocated for its withdrawal, he cannot thereafter contest the taking. See, e.g., 716 S.W.2d 45, 45–46 (Tex. 1986). Courts have reasoned that the withdrawal or advocacy for withdrawal effectively constitutes consent to the taking. See, e.g., id. GCA neither withdrew any money from the registry nor advocated for the Club to withdraw the money. Therefore, Tejas and its progeny are inapposite.

GCA makes several arguments in support of its contention that the trial court erred by granting Galveston County's Motion to Require Proof of Standing.3 Because of the unique posture of this case, we need not reach most of the arguments raised by GCA.

Standing is implicit in the concept of subject-matter jurisdiction, and subject-matter jurisdiction is essential to the authority of a court to decide a case. Tex. Ass'n of Bus. v. Tex. Air Control Bd., 852 S.W.2d 440, 443 (Tex. 1993).

We review standing under the same standard by which we review subject-matter jurisdiction generally. Id. at 446. Whether the trial court has subject-matter jurisdiction is a question of law that we review de novo. Tex. Dep't of Transp. v. A.P.I. Pipe & Supply, LLC, 397 S.W.3d 162, 166 (Tex. 2013); Tex. Dep't of


Parks & Wildlife v. Miranda, 133 S.W.3d 217, 226 (Tex. 2004).

The question of standing applies to a plaintiff or a party seeking affirmative relief. The standing inquiry "focuses on the question of who may bring an action." Vernco Constr., Inc. v. Nelson, 460 S.W.3d 145, 149 (Tex. 2015) (quotation omitted); see Lazarides v. Farris, 367 S.W.3d 788, 796–97 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2012, no pet.) (same); see also Lewis v. Aurora Loan Servs., No. 01- 15-00362-CV, 2016 WL 887176, *3 (Tex. App.—Houston [1st Dist.] Mar. 8, 2016, no pet.) (mem. op.) ("The defendants are not the plaintiffs in this case.

3 First, GCA argues that it had a justiciable interest in the condemnation of Rollover Pass because before the condemnation suit commenced, it had "provided supervision over the property." Second, GCA states that many of its members "had property or livelihoods which depended, in some degree, on the continuing success of Rollover Pass as a public attraction." Third, GCA suggests that it may have associational standing as a "public interest group." Fourth, GCA argues that Galveston County's standing argument is precluded by estoppel. GCA complains that Galveston County raised its standing argument "after the GCA had participated in the litigation for about a year, with the tacit approval of the County." GCA points out that in Galveston County's First Amended Petition, the County identified the GCA as a defendant. Finally, GCA asserts standing as a leaseholder of a Rollover Pass. Lewis is. Thus, the issue is not whether defendants have standing to maintain this action.").

Condemnation of private property involves a twopart process prescribed in sections 21.012 through 21.016 of the Texas Property Code. Tex. Prop. Code Ann. § 21.011 (West 2018). During the first phase, the party seeking condemnation initiates an administrative proceeding by filing a petition for condemnation in the trial court. Tex. Prop. Code Ann. § 21.012 (West 2018); Hubenak v. San Jacinto Gas Transmission Co., 141 S.W.3d 172, 179 (Tex. 2004); Amason v. Nat. Gas Pipeline Co., 682 S.W.2d 240, 241 (Tex. 1984). Once a petition is filed, the trial court appoints three disinterested individuals as special commissioners to assess the damages. Tex. Prop. Code Ann. § 21.014 (West 2018). The special commissioners conduct a hearing to determine the amount of damages. Tex. Prop. Code Ann. § 21.015 (West 2018). If either party files objections to the special commissioners' award,4 "the . . . award is vacated and the administrative proceeding converts into a normal pending cause in the court with the condemnor as plaintiff and the condemnee as defendant." Amason, 682 S.W.2d at 242. In the judicial proceeding, the burden of proof regarding the right to take is generally on

4 Only "owners" are entitled to share in condemnation award. See Tex. Prop. Code Ann. § 21.042 (West 2018) (referring to property owners as those entitled to compensation). However, the See ROLLOVER page 34

term "owner" is broadly defined in the eminent domain context. The term "owner," as used in the statutes governing eminent domain, embraces not only the owner but also a tenant for life, a lessee for years, and any other person who has an interest in the property that will be affected by the condemnation. Houston North Shore Ry. Co. v. Tyrrell, 98 S.W.2d 786, 793 (Tex. 1936) ("The term 'owner' as used in condemnation statutes, embraces not only the owner of the fee but a tenant for life, a lessee for years, and any other person who has an interest in the property that will be affected by the condemnation."); see Elliot v. Joseph, 351 S.W.2d 879, 884 (Tex. 1961) ("The term 'owner' in this sense includes a lessee for years as well as any other person who has an interest in the property."); State v. Fiesta Mart, Inc., 233 S.W.3d 50, 55 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2007, pet. denied) ("Unless a contrary provision exists in the lease agreement, a lessee is entitled, as a matter of law, to share in a condemnation award when part of its leasehold interest is lost by condemnation.")

the condemnor, while the burden to prove the value of condemned property is on the condemnee. Religious of Sacred Heart of Tex. v. City of Houston, 836 S.W.2d 606, 613 (Tex. 1992).

We conclude that because GCA is the defendant in this condemnation cause of action, GCA is not required to establish standing. As the plaintiff, condemnor Galveston County, not the defendant condemnee GCA, sought affirmative relief in the court below. Galveston County amended its petition to add GCA as a defendant, and Galveston County asserts that GCA is bound by the trial court's resulting judgment that GCA has no leasehold interest in the property and is not entitled to compensation. Thus, there was a real controversy between Galveston County and GCA regarding whether GCA had a compensable interest in the property, and that controversy was actually determined by the relief Galveston County sought and obtained from the trial court. See Austin Nursing Ctr., Inc. v. Lovato, 171 S.W.3d 845, 849 (Tex. 2005) (explaining these two requirements for standing). GCA did not intervene in the suit or file any counterclaim. Other than a motion for new trial, GCA did not file any motion for affirmative relief.

Galveston County argues, "when a condemnation case reaches the compensation stage, a party nominally called a Defendant becomes more like a Plaintiff." We disagree that this observation affects the standing analysis. As a condemnee, GCA filed objections to the special commissioners' award and GCA had the burden to prove the amount of adequate compensation for the taking. Religious of Sacred Heart of Tex., 836 S.W.2d at 613. However, neither its objections nor the shifted burden converted GCA into a plaintiff. See Collin Cty. v. Hixon Family P'ship, Ltd., 365 S.W.3d 860, 866-68 (Tex. App.—Dallas 2012, pet. denied) (holding neither objections nor shifting of burden to prove adequate compensation causes condemnee to become plaintiff in trial court) (citing Denton 9 Cty. v. Brammer, 361 S.W.2d 198, 200 (Tex. 1962)); see also Duncan v. Calhoun Cty. Navigation Dist., 28 S.W.3d 707, 709 (Tex. App.—Corpus Christi 2000, pet. denied) (holding that issues of "right to take" and "just compensation" are components of single, indivisible condemnation cause of action). If GCA failed to carry its burden to prove it had a compensable leasehold interest, the consequence would be a binding judgment that GCA is not entitled to compensation from Galveston County, not a dismissal of Galveston County's suit against GCA for lack of subject-matter jurisdiction. Galveston County cannot have it both ways.

Moreover, even if GCA could be analogized to a plaintiff, its failure to prove entitlement to compensation would not deprive the court of subject-matter jurisdiction. See Dubai Petroleum Co. v. Kazi, 12 S.W.3d 71, 76–77 (Tex. 2000) ("The right of a plaintiff to maintain a suit, while frequently treated as going to the question of jurisdiction, has been said to go in reality to the right of the plaintiff to relief rather than to the jurisdiction of the court to afford it." (quoting 21 C.J.S. Courts § 16, at 23 (1990))); Mitchell v. Turbine Res. Unlimited, Inc., 523 S.W.3d 189, 197 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2017, pet. denied) (holding that whether property belongs to party is question going to merits of court's order, not court's jurisdiction). For these reasons, the trial court erred by determining that GCA lacked standing.

Galveston County points to the decision of this court in Mayberry v. Kinder Morgan Crude & Condensate, LLC, No. 14-16-00523-CV, 2018 WL 456709 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] Jan. 18, 2018, pet. denied) (mem. op.), as a case where this court determined that a condemnee lacked standing. In Mayberry, Mayberry himself (the condemnee) asserted in trial court filings that he had no interest in the property being condemned. Id. at *2-3. Mayberry also asserted in various trial court filings that the court lacked jurisdiction to hear the case because he was the 10 "wrong defendant." Id. at *3. As such, Mayberry judicially admitted he was not a proper party to the case. Nonetheless, the case was called to trial and Mayberry was permitted to testify regarding his ownership interest in the property at issue before a determination was made with respect to his "standing." ld. The trial court signed a final judgment only after hearing evidence at trial. The judgment stated that Mayberry failed to meet his burden to prove that he had an ownership interest in the property. Id. Although this court ultimately held that Mayberry lacked "standing" because he had no compensable interest in the See ROLLOVER page 35



property at issue, the holding was based on Mayberry's judicial admissions and his failure at trial to establish any ownership interest in the property. Id. at *4–5; see also id. at *1 ("Because we conclude that Mayberry lacks an ownership interest in the condemned property, we affirm the trial court's judgment."). As such, Mayberry does not properly support Galveston County's assertion that a condemnee has the burden to establish standing, much less that its failure to do so deprives the court of subject-matter jurisdiction yet does not prevent the court from issuing a judgment binding the condemnee. We decline to extend Mayberry to support such holdings, which would be contrary to the decisions cited above.

Even if a condemnor could properly assert a condemnee lacks standing to participate in a condemnation suit initiated by the condemnor, a condemnor's right to dismiss a condemnation proceeding is generally limited after the condemnor has taken possession of the property. Hooks v. Fourth Court of Appeals, 808 S.W.2d 56, 60 (Tex. 1991). After a condemnor takes constructive or actual possession of a property, the condemnor may dismiss the condemnation proceeding only if the owner is not prejudiced or harmed as a result. Id. at 60–61; see Fort Worth Concrete Co. v. State, 400 S.W.2d 314, 315–17 (Tex. 1966) (rejecting request for dismissal of party based argument that party had no interest in land sought to be 11 condemned where condemnor had already taken possession); see also Mount Vernon United Methodist Church v. Harris Cty., No. 14-16-00590-CV, 2017 WL 1512251, *2 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] Apr. 25, 2017) (mem. op.) (quoting Fort Worth Concrete, 400 S.W.2d at 317, and applying its principles to a lienholder).

Here, it is undisputed that Galveston County deposited the commissioner's award into the court registry and thereby gained constructive possession of the property. See Hooks, 808 S.W.2d at 61. Whether GCA was prejudiced by Galveston County's constructive taking is a factual matter the trial court did not address. See id. For this reason and because GCA is not the plaintiff in this action and seeks no affirmative relief other than the "just compensation" that is part and parcel of Galveston County's condemnation cause of action, the trial court erred by granting Galveston County's Motion to Require Proof of Standing. We sustain GCA's first issue.

C. Summary judgment on right to take

GCA's second issue challenges the trial court's ruling on Galveston County's motion for partial summary judgment on the "right to take." Analysis of this issue is premature. Galveston County argues GCA waived the issue "because it was never raised in response to the County's summary judgment motion on the right to take." However, the motion for partial summary judgment was not clearly asserted against GCA.

At oral argument, counsel for Galveston County took the position that the motion was asserted against both defendants. In its partial motion for summary judgment on the "right to take," however, Galveston County took the position that GCA had no ownership interest in the property. In a few instances in the motion, Galveston County referred to "Defendants," plural, but the motion was based on 12 the landowner's inability to show fraud, bad faith, or arbitrary and capricious acts, and Galveston County did not acknowledge, or even argue in the alternative, that GCA was a landowner. Instead, Galveston County relied upon its Motion to Require Proof of Standing to eliminate GCA from the case. Although GCA joined the Club's response to the partial motion and other related briefing, it is not clear that the trial court ruled on Galveston County's right to take the property from GCA.

We conclude that in this circumstance, the appropriate course is to remand the case to the trial court for further proceedings. See Associated Air Ctr. v. Tary Network Ltd., No. 05-13-00685-CV, 2015 WL 970664, at *7 (Tex. App.—Dallas Mar. 4, 2015, no pet.) (mem. op.) ("As long as there is a probability a case has for any reason not been fully developed, an appellate court has the discretion to remand rather than render a decision."); see also United States Fire Ins. Co. v. Carter, 473 S.W.2d 2, 3 (Tex. 1971) (holding remand is appropriate when a case, for any reason, has not been fully developed); Scott Bader, Inc. v. Sandstone Prods., Inc., 248 S.W.3d 802, 822 (Tex. App.—Houston [1st Dist.] 2008, no pet.) (same); De Monet v. PERA, 877 S.W.2d 352, 361 (Tex. App.—Dallas 1994, no writ) ("Addressing . . . independent grounds not considered by the trial court usurps the trial court's authority to evaluate and rule on issues before it and denies the appellate court the benefit of the trial court's decision.").

On remand, Galveston County will have a full and fair opportunity to assert its claims regarding GCA's ownership interests, or lack thereof, on summary judgment and, if necessary, its right to take with respect to GCA. We think this result best comports with the interest of justice. See Tex. R. App. P. 43.3(b).

III. CONCLUSION

We reverse the trial court's order granting Galveston County's Motion to Require Proof of Standing and reverse its judgment as to GCA. We remand the case to the trial court for further proceedings.







William loved life and he had many amazing stories of his experiences and travels. He loved his family, and his friends and he loved his job as a longshoreman at the Port of Houston.


